#### **TROPHIES**

The following prizes and trophies will be awarded:

Wendy Lees Memorial Trophy – for the most points in the horticultural classes (1-22).

Dee Kiddle Cup – for the best exhibit in the cooking classes.

Elizabeth Cawson Trophy – for the best exhibit in the flower arranging classes.

Privett Flower Show Challenge Cup – for the best non daffodil horticultural exhibit (14-22).

Graham-Clarke Plate – for the best exhibit in the daffodil classes (1 -13).

Banksian Medal – points from this show will be added to those from the Summer Show for the horticultural classes only.

## The Basic Daffodil Dictionary:

Corona refers to the cup or trumpet.

Perianth refers to the petals.

**Reflexed** petals are those which are angled away from the corona. **Pedicel** is the 'neck' of the flower which joins it to the stem.

## Horticultural Classification of Daffodils

#### Division 1: Trumpet



One flower per stem; longer corona (ie 'trumpet') at least as long as the perianth segments ('petals').

## Division 2: Large Cupped



One flower per stem; shorter corona (ie 'cup') is more than 1/3, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments ('petals').

## Division 3: Small Cupped



One flower per stem; corona ('cup') not more than 1/3 the length of the perianth segments (petals).

#### Division 4: Double



One or more flowers per stem; double the number of perianth segments or the corona or both.

#### Division 5: Triandrus



Usually two or more pendent flowers per stem, perianth segments often reflexed.

## Division 6: Cyclamineus



One flower per stem; perianth segments prominently reflexed. Flower at an acute angle to the stem with a very short pedicel.

## Div 7: Jonquilla and Apodanthus



Usually 1 to 5 (more rarely, up to 8) flowers per stem, perianth segments reflexed or spreading, corona is cup or funnel shaped or flared, usually wider than long. Usually fragrant.

#### Division 8: Tazetta



3 to 20 flowers per stem, perianth segments spreading (not reflexed) and usually fragrant.

## **Division 9: Poeticus**



Usually one flower per stem; perianth segments white, corona very short or disc shaped, usually with a green/yellow centre and red rim but sometimes of a single colour. Usually fragrant.

#### Division 10: Bulbicodium



Usually one flower per stem; perianth segments insignificant compared to the corona; anthers dorsifixed (ie attached central to filament); filament, style curved.

## Division 11: Split Corona



Corona (cup or trumpet) is split, usually for more than 1/2 its length. Either with the corona segments opposite the perianth segments usually in two whorls of three (type A), or with the corona segments alternate to the perianth segments, usually in a single whorl of 6 (type B).

## Division 12: Other

This is for the 'miscellaneous' cultivars which do not fit the other classifications.

#### Division 13: Other

This classification is for the cultivars distinguished solely by botanical name.

## RULES

All horticultural exhibits must be bone fide produce of the exhibitor, grown by him/her for a period of at least six weeks prior to the date of the Show. This does not apply to Flower Arrangement classes. The Committee reserves the right to refuse an entry.

No person shall stage more than one entry in each class. 2 or more persons shall not exhibit for prizes from the same garden in the same class, except Flower Arrangement classes.

All persons intending to exhibit must submit an entry form and fee to the Show Secretary (Tel 01730 266529), a Committee Member, or Froxfield Stores by 5pm on THURSDAY 26<sup>th</sup> MARCH.

The Hall will be open at 8.00 am and staging must be completed by 10.15 am on the morning of the Show.

The decision of the judges will be final as to the relative merits of the exhibits and the decision of any 3 Committee Members for other matters connected with the Show.

All exhibits, personal property etc will be at the risk of the exhibitor and the Committee will not be responsible for loss or damage.

Prizes will be awarded or withheld at the discretion of the Judges.

No persons, other than those appointed by the Committee, shall be present whilst judging is taking place.

Exhibits must not be removed until after the Prize Giving.

Exhibitors to provide their own uncoloured glass containers or vases.

Moss, paper or similar may be used to help support flowers on exhibit in a vase.

- 1. 3 Daffodils long trumpet all yellow one variety (Ref Division 1)
- 2. 3 Daffodils long trumpet all white one variety (Ref Division 1)
- 3. 3 Daffodils long trumpet bi colour one variety (Ref Division 1)
- 4. 1 Daffodil all vellow
- 5. 1 Daffodil white or bi colour
- 6. 3 Daffodils large cupped any colour one variety (Ref Division 2)
- 7. 3 double Daffodils one variety (Ref Division 4)
- 8. 3 multi headed Daffodils one variety (Ref Division 5,7or 8)
- 9. 3 small cupped Daffodils one variety (Ref Division 3 or 9)
- 10. A collection of 7 different Daffodils
- 11. 3 miniature Daffodils one variety (Small head and stem)
- 12. 3 cyclamineus Daffodils (Ref Division 6)
- 13. 5 Tete a tete Daffodils in a pot, which does not exceed 15cm (6") in diameter

# NB All the above classes are botanically classed as Daffodils but are sometimes referred to as Narcissi. See Basic Daffodil Dictionary enclosed.

- 14. 3 stems of Polyanthus any varieties
- 15. 3 stems of any other bulb, corm or rhizome one variety
- 16. 3 stems of different named shrubs or trees in flower one stem of each variety. All must be named
- 17. 1 single bloom of Camellia any variety
- 18. 3 stems of different evergreen shrubs or trees not in flower one stem of each variety. All must be named.
- 19. 3 stems of Hellebores any varieties
- 20. 5 Hellebore blooms floating in a glass bowl any varieties
- 21. 3 stems of any other spring flower
- 22. Flowering pot plant

#### NB Classes 14, 19 and 20 - different varieties and colours are acceptable

#### FLOWER ARRANGEMENTS – Accessories allowed

The judge will disqualify any arrangement exceeding the given dimensions.

- 23. 'A Host of Golden Daffodils' not to exceed 50cm wide (20")
- 24. An Easter Posy
- 25. Arrangement in a jug not to exceed 15cm (6") in any direction.
